



SHALOM!

The Jewish people, who originated from the forefather Abraham, can look back on a rich history of almost 4,000 years. Once called to dwell in the Promised Land, they were soon scattered to different countries and even other continents. To this day, Jewish people can be found all over the world.

In this booklet, we want to look at some of the countries and continents with different sized Jewish populations and ask: What is their story? How do they differ from one another? And most importantly, how can we reach them with the Good News of Yeshua haMashiach (Hebrew for Jesus Christ)?

For Jewish ministries, countries with high Jewish populations are often the first ports of call for establishing mission agencies, churches, or other ministries. We are excited to hear in this booklet about how Jewish people have been reached with the Gospel in these parts of the world over the years and decades.

We want to praise God for the Jewish people in these countries who have accepted Yeshua as their Savior and Redeemer. And we want to be thankful for all the workers who have been called to the ministries there. At the same time, we want to stand in prayer

that Jewish ministries will continue to grow, that the seeds of the gospel will be scattered and fall on fertile ground. We pray that Jewish groups who have rarely heard the Gospel will be reached.

Furthermore, we want to look into other countries and whole continents:

Let us not forget the countries with a small Jewish population and only small ministries exist. Let us pray that the Lord will send workers into the harvest especially where Jewish people have hardly been reached so far. Let us also not forget the ministries among Jewish and Israeli tourists who faithfully share the Gospel with those who are passing through – such as in New Zealand, India and South America.

For the Jewish people all have one thing in common: they need Yeshua! They need the hope and life that only the Gospel brings! Each and every one of them is worthy to be reached with the Good News.

THE POWER OF PRAYER

Ministry among the Jewish people is not easy. Secular Jewish people often don't want to know about Yeshua any more than they want to know about any other religion. The Orthodox Jewish community is very closed, and it is difficult to reach them with the Gospel.

The prejudice that one cannot believe in Yeshua as a Jew or that one would then cease to be Jewish is persistent. Yet both Yeshua himself and all his disciples were convinced Jews. In the early church, even the reverse question arose, whether it was permissible to believe in the Jewish Messiah as a non-Jew.

That has changed: today, there are many Gentiles in ministry among Jewish people who feel called to bless the Jewish people.

In any case, one thing is certain: Jewish ministries in different countries need prayer! Prayer for open hearts and good conversations. Prayer for wise and powerful words. Prayer for the work of the Spirit and for revival. But also prayer for courage and perseverance, especially when it seems difficult and little fruit is seen.

Prayer is powerful! It is an incredible encouragement for all workers to know that they are being prayed for. It is a spiritual reality that prayer works miracles! Through prayer, hearts become soft and receptive to the Gospel. Through prayer, Jewish people come to living faith in Yeshua!

Thank you for praying with us this year. This is a precious part of the worldwide ministry to the Jewish people.



FROM ROSH HASHANAH TO YOM KIPPUR

Around the world, in all countries and on all continents where Jews live, Rosh haShanah and Yom Kippur are two of the highest Jewish holidays in the year.

In the 10 days between Rosh haShanah and Yom Kippur, our "10 Days of Prayer" take place. These ten days are also considered "days of repentance" in Judaism. Whether in Europe, Asia or America, many Jewish people attend synagogue on the holidays and are especially open to faith issues during these days.



Rosh haShanah (Hebrew for "beginning of the year") goes back to the biblical holiday "Yom haTerua" (Hebrew for "day of blowing", Leviticus 23:24) and today marks the beginning of the Jewish year.

The shofar (ram's horn) plays an important role and is blown several times on this day. Among other things, it symbolizes the call to repentance. In Judaism, there is a belief that God opens the Book of Life on Rosh ha-Shanah and calls people to repentance. In the Jewish mind, this includes the call and opportunity for repentance and reconciliation with God and fellow human beings.

At the end of the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur), the Book of Life is closed, sealing the fate for the rest of

the year. That is why it is so spiritually significant on these 10 days that many Jewish people come into contact with the real life, Yeshua (cf. John 14:6).

For each day we chose a different country with specific prayer requests. Learn some things about the Jewish population in these countries and have your heart moved for God's chosen people.



NOTE

According to Jewish tradition, a day begins at sunset and lasts until the next sunset. Therefore, the 10 days of prayer begin on Sep 15 in the evening and end on Sep 25 before sunset.

From all other countries except Germany, our partner ministries report with their local staff about the respective ministries. Our partner ministries are called: Chosen People Ministries US, Chosen People Ministries Canada, Chosen People Ministries UK, Le Berger d'Israel in France, Emet Ministries in South Africa and Celebrate Messiah in Australia, Chosen People Ministries in India, Ministerios el Pueblo Elegido, Beth Sar Shalom and Centro Mesiánico Derej Haemuna in Argentina and Beit Sar Shalom in Israel.

The Jewish population figures given (source: https://www.jpr.org. uk) are calculations based on certain limiting criteria. For example, people who ,only' have a Jewish father are not counted as Jewish. Another example concerns Jewish people with more than one nationality, who thus may not appear in the statistics. For these reasons, we assume that the real numbers are often significantly higher than indicated.



USA & CANADA



Jewish Population: USA approx. 6 million Canada 392.000

Jewish people have lived in North America since about the 17th century. To date, the Jewish population has grown significantly, primarily through immigration.

Ministry among Jewish people began in 1894 in Brooklyn, New York, with a Jewish rabbi who shared his faith in Yeshua with other Jewish people despite great hostility. Since then, our staff has spread across the U.S. and Canada to minister in areas with large Jewish communities.

In doing so, our ministries are diverse: online, on the streets, at universities, in Messianic communities, and at summer camps, we share the Good News of Yeshua, the Messiah.

This year, we plan to expand our activities to the ultra-Orthodox Jewish community, especially in and around New York City. During the year, we will also launch Host Israelis, a network of Christian hosts in the U.S. who host Israeli travelers in their homes. In Canada, we are running the Toronto Israel Conference and offering "Shalom Toronto", a short-term mission trip.

"Every Monday, Anna meets with other staff in Toronto at a coffee shop to spend some time in prayer, Bible reading and ministry planning. At one of these meetings, Anna suddenly said: 'I get the impression we're supposed to tell a person in this coffee shop about Yeshua. Let's pray that the Lord will show them to us.' After a few minutes, Kari, the waitress, came by and Anna asked: 'Do you believe in Jesus?' Kari replied: 'I'm Jewish!

I only read the Old Testament.' Anna told her about prophecies, especially from the book of Isaiah. Kari was moved: 'Oh, you know the Scriptures!' Anna and the group told her how much they love the Bible and the Jewish people and pray for peace in Jerusalem. They also gave her a booklet on salvation, which she promised to read."

SOUTH AMERICA



Jewish Population: 250.000

More than fifty years before the first lewish settlers arrived on the shores of Manhattan in 1654. there were already Jewish people in South America. Today, Latin America's Jewish people live mainly in Argentina and Brazil.

Jewish people have long been part of Argentine life. In addition to numerous cultural and religious Jewish institutions, such as one of the world's leading Rabbinical schools, there is also a Jewish Messianic community in Buenos Aires.

Although most Jewish people are secular. Orthodox Judaism is on the rise. The director and Messianic Rabbi Jose Lewin grew up in an Orthodox family in Argentina himself, was ordained as a rabbi.

and came to believe in Yeshua through our services. As such, he is a wonderful contact person for Orthodox Jews and their questions about the Gospel:

"When Avi. an Orthodox Jew. learned about our ministry, he wanted to know if we were really Jewish. He met with Jose and was so impressed that he brought a friend to the next meeting. They discussed the Hebrew prophecies and were so excited that they now wanted to know more about what it is like to be lewish and to believe in Yeshua. The third time, they also brought their wives. They have been meeting regularly ever since and have started reading the New Testament!"

THE OTHER COUNTRIES OF LATIN AMERICA


Jewish people live in Brazil, Uruquay and other Latin American countries. Since evangelical Christianity has been on the rise throughout Latin America, there has also been a renewed interest in Israel and the Jewish people. Specifically in Brazil, we have recently begun ministry among Israeli backpackers.

GERMANY



Jewish Population: 150,000

Germany has a very eventful Jewish history. Some of the greatest German poets and thinkers were of Jewish origin. Germany, as the cradle of the Haskalah, the Jewish Enlightenment, was also significant in the internal development in Judaism. At the same time, the Holocaust caused such a terrible and profound break in Jewish history like no other country.

After the Second World War, only a small community of Jews remained in Germany. It is all the more astonishing that today Germany is once again the third-largest Jewish community in Europe. The main reason for this is the immigration of Jews from the countries of the former Soviet Union since the 1990s. Nowadays, however, there are also many Israelis who make Berlin and Germany their new home.

Thus, the ministries in this country have different focus areas: coming to terms with history, reconciliation and good relations with Israel, educational work in Christian communities and, foremost, sharing the gospel. Although this is often viewed critically, the Jewish people still need Yeshua - just like all other people. What a treasure it is when they come to faith in their Messiah!

In many German cities there are synagogues, where often heterogeneous groups of German- and Russian-speaking visitors meet. This is also true of the approximately 40 Jewish Messianic congregations and groups.

"Channah got in touch with Manuela from the Jewish Messianic community in Berlin in the summer of 2019. Manuela kept inviting Channah until she came to the Feast of Tabernacles last year. Since then,

she has been coming regularly to services and Shabbat meetings. She is open to the faith, but also has many questions. A friendship has developed through which Manuela is a witness to the Good News. But it takes constant prayer and we hope she will open her heart to Yeshua soon!"

UNITED KINGDOM



Jewish Population: 300,000

The United Kingdom is one of the few countries in the Diaspora that is experiencing population growth among the Jewish population. This is mainly due to the fact that ultra-Orthodox families often have many children. In fact, it is expected that by 2030, 50% of all Jewish children in the UK will be ultra-Orthodox. Therefore, we are currently striving to better understand the ultra-Orthodox faith and share the Gospel with these people

"After a relatively fruitless morning of going door-to-door to share the Gospel, Simon saw Erez, an Orthodox man, cleaning his car. Simon asked him if he wanted to sell the car. 'Yes', Erez replied, and a long conversation ensued about God, the Messiah, and Yeshua!

They exchanged contacts and look forward to meeting again."

In addition to such conversations that arise quite informally on the street and in the neighborhood, we want to conduct an evangelism outreach called "Shalom London" especially during this time of the high Jewish holidays in autumn.

However, since by no means all British Jews are Orthodox, a staff member will also participate in a New Age exhibition. We will have a booth there where we hope to reach Jewish people who visit this exhibition with prayers for healing.

There needs to be vibrant Christian and Jewish Messianic congregations in the neighborhoods where many Jewish people live. When these Jewish people gain

interest in the Messiah Yeshua, then they should be able to experience locally in a congregation what it looks like practically to be a Yeshua-follower.

FRANCE



The Jewish population of France is probably the largest in the Diaspora after the United States. Especially in the big cities there are many Sephardic Jews, i.e. Jewish people originally from Spain, Portugal or the North African countries. They differ from other Jews in their culture and language.

Our workers who preach the Gospel among Jewish people in France can be counted on two hands. Currently, we are active mainly in Strasbourg, Marseille and Paris. We distribute literature on the streets, such as New Testaments and booklets with testimonies of Jewish people who have come to faith in Yeshua.

We celebrate Jewish holidays locally and on Zoom. We teach the

scriptures, offer various services on the Internet, and make discipleship. We are also working on a book about the Jewish view of Messianic prophecies in Bereshit, Genesis.

We hope that our staff will be able to start new ministries in Strasbourg and Marseille as soon as possible. In Paris, at the moment, it is still difficult to find suitable premises. In all projects we want to handle the finances entrusted to us wisely.


A new project is our Shalom Café. The idea is to create a cozy place where we can have coffee with our Jewish friends and discuss frequently asked questions, such as "If Yeshua is the Messiah, why is there no peace on earth?"

UKRAINE



In the 13th century Jewish people began to emigrate from Western Europe to the East, including to the territory of today's Ukraine. Since then, Ukraine has had a rich Jewish history. Among other things, Hasidism, a mystical form of Judaism, emerged in Ukraine. Unfortunately, the Jewish community in Ukraine also experienced terrible anti-Semitism in the form of pogroms and the Holocaust.

As early as the 1920s, a ministry was established among Jewish people in Kiev and Odessa. During communism, public ministry was not possible for many decades. However, after the fall of the Soviet Union, all the more Messianic congregations and ministries emerged in

Ukraine, including some of the largest Messianic congregations in the world in terms of numbers.

The war which has been going on since last year has had its consequences. While some Messianic congregations continue to faithfully serve their parishioners and those in need, there are also many Jews and Messianic Jews who have fled the war. Thus, ministry among Ukrainian Jews takes place mainly in Western Ukraine, Poland, Germany and Israel.

Some staff members travel periodically to these areas and countries to assist Ukrainian Jews with humanitarian aid and to bring them the light of the Gospel. We also offer camps for children and youth who have been affected by the war. In this way, the hope and love of Yeshua can be passed on in a very practical

way, as Gregory experienced:

"I don't know who you are, but I see an undeniable proof of love. You came to me when no one else would help me. I was sitting in my apartment without electricity and heating, and you brought me what I needed most. And then you told me that it was not because of you, but because of the love of the Jewish Messiah. That broke my heart. Thank you - and tell me more about Him!"

SOUTH AFRICA



Jewish Population: 65,000

The history of the Jewish people in South Africa began mainly with the general European settlement in the 19th century. It is estimated that about 80% of South African Jews originated from Lithuania. Jewish people played an important role in the development of the diamond and gold fields and later many Jewish people were involved in the anti-apartheid movement.

South African Jewry differs significantly from that in other developing countries in that the majority of Jews still live in South Africa. Thus, the Jewish community in South Africa is currently the largest in Africa. Interestingly, it is also one of the most Orthodox in the world and is under the strong influence of the Hasidic Orthodox group "Chabad Lubavitch". They have a large

network of institutions in Johannesburg, including a large yeshiva (Talmud school). Another Chabad program in Pretoria has ordained over 110 rabbis since its inception in 2001.

There are evangelistic ministries

among the Jewish population in Pretoria, Johannesburg and Cape Town. We maintain good partnerships with various organizations and churches. Although we are considered a "dangerous" ministry because we actively share the Gospel with Jewish people, we have a good relationship with the Jewish community. The Lord has given us great favor among the elderly Jewish people, and we have seen a number of elderly Jews come to faith in Yeshua.

We are also working with a group of young adults in Cape Town,

made up of Jewish and non-Jewish believers. They bring the Gospel message to young Jewish adults. Over the past sixteen years, a number of Jewish people have come to faith in Yeshua in Pretoria, Johannesburg and Cape Town. We hope that the ministry will continue to grow!

AUSTRALIA



Jewish Population: 130,000

The history of the Jewish people in Australia began with eight Jewish convicts from England who arrived with the first fleet in a Sydney bay in 1788. Today, an estimated 130,000 Jewish people live in Australia, most of them in the two largest cities, Sydney and Melbourne.

Melbourne has a vibrant, centrally located Jewish population of about 60,000 with 45 Jewish synagogues and Beit HaMashiach, the largest Jewish Messianic congregation in the country. Melbourne also has the world's highest percentage of Holocaust survivors in its population, apart from Israel.

Being a young country developed by immigrants mainly from the UK and Europe but in more recent times India and China, Australia is heralded as one of the most multicultural in the world. Jewish people have made it to the top in all fields such as medicine, law, education, and politics. Thus, while anti-Semitism has traditionally been less pronounced in Australia than in other parts of the world, it is nonetheless a growing problem.

The Australian population, including Jewish people, is relatively secular, and so challenging to bring the Gospel. As in many other countries, Orthodox Jews strongly condemn any attempt to spread the Good News of Yeshua.

Therefore, our local staff tries to reach Jewish people with this unique message primarily through personal evangelism. They also hospitably welcome Israeli travellers into their homes, hold services

and community Passover Seders. Recently, a new online Messianic training center has been established to equip Messianic Jews and non-Jews for ministry.

INDIA



Jewish Population: 5,000 Indian Jews, 50,000 Young Israeli Tourists every year

Jewish people have lived in India for centuries, but most of them have now emigrated to Israel. On the other hand, about 50,000 young Israelis travel to India every year after completing their military service.

In the army, they often have painful and disturbing experiences. To ease this pain in their hearts, and in search of peace, they try out various Eastern religions, New Age techniques, and the use of drugs.

One place that many Israelis visit on their travels is Goa, the smallest state in the western part of India. In Goa, a ministry center was established in 2009 with a few guest rooms and a coffee house called "Mika Mocha". "Mika Mocha" is a play on words relating to the Hebrew biblical phrase "Mi kamocha?" ("Who is like you, Lord?"). At the center, we host Shabbat dinners on Fridays, among other events, and witness to Israelis about God's love and the Good News of Yeshua.

Over the years, trustful relationships have developed and we continue to share the Good News of Yeshua in personal encounters, through text messages and online. We furthermore hold conferences and trainings and teach in churches about God's heart for Israel.

After befriending a young woman and sharing the gospel with her, we gave her a book about the messianic prophecies of the Old Testament prophets. Through tears she said, "I came looking for peace, and I believe I have found it."

Jerusalem is Israel's eternal capital. From the time of the Biblical prophets, kings and Zionist leaders, Jerusalem has been a part of history for thousands of years. There is a modern city with tall buildings and roads and an Old City, a place surrounded by strong fortification walls and old, meandering cobblestoned streets and alleys. Within the city itself, you can find all sorts of people, but mainly outwardly religious Jewish people.

The ultra-Orthodox (strictly observant Jews) predominately live in Jerusalem because of their proximity to the Western Wall, the holiest site for Judaism as it is clo-

sest to what would have been the Second Temple. There, people can be found praying night and day for the coming of the Messiah.

Our Ministry Center is based in Jerusalem for this purpose, to tell people the Good News of Yeshua the promised Messiah. Our team in Jerusalem reaches out to neighbors and friends in a friendly, respectful way. We also have a vibrant ministry among Holocaust Survivors through small group gatherings, social events and special meetings serving hot nutritious food for different Jewish holidays. It is a joy to be able to serve these dear people.

Tel Aviv is a vibrant city with lots of wonderful activities to choose from – beautiful beaches, walking/ running boardwalk, numerous cafes and notable restaurants and fashion and technological advancement. With that, it is the hub for young people to come to live and enjoy all the action and work opportunities. The young people come with open minds and hearts and many enjoy talking about spiritual things. Our workers in Tel Aviv have eager and open conversations with young people about Yeshua.



Besides the young people, there are also lots of young families, students and soldiers which add to the mixture of ministry opportunities. There are some religious and ultra-Orthodox in the Tel Aviv area, but they don't mingle too much with the secular population.

We have a vibrant Ministry Center that reaches out to all these segments of Tel Aviv society! The ministry team loves having open and honest conversations with people, hearing their thoughts and questions and often a time to pray for someone!

Throughout the month, we will have sabbath dinners on Friday, worship events, concerts, bible studies, children's holiday events and Hebrew language acquisition for Holocaust Survivors.

When people come inside the Ministry Center, they often comment they sense something "different" – it is the Lord!


